Congregational Meeting to discuss the Visioning Committee's Interim Report Annesley Sanctuary $\sim 9:45$ a.m. \sim Sunday, May 29^{th} Before the service with Rev. Kathy Underwood

At the October 17th Special Meeting of the Congregation, a "Visioning Team" was put together to address the major challenges that Annesley United Church faces.

The Board of Elders designed instructions to the Visioning Team in a Terms of Reference document at their November meeting, instructing them to make recommendations that could be presented to the congregation so decisions could be made about how Annesley will proceed in the future.

At the May 10th meeting of the Board of Elders, the Visioning Team presented their Interim Report, which addressed and made recommendations for the following mandate: "To consider ways for the building to better pay for itself whether through partnerships with other denominations, utilization of church space for other paying services such as daycare, or even sale of the building."

As some of the recommendations call for steps that require expenditure of funds, a meeting has been called for *9:45 a.m.* on *Sunday, May 29th, in the Sanctuary*, so the Visioning Team can present the Interim Report to the congregation. Everyone is encouraged to attend, to ask questions and to give their input about the recommendations. If the majority of attendees are in agreement, we hope to move ahead as soon as possible. Copies of the report were sent out yesterday, contact us if you did not receive one.

HIKE FOR HOSPICE – A group from Annesley will be participating in the annual Grey Bruce Hike for Hospice **THIS SUNDAY** after services. The Hike for Hospice brings together families, friends and palliative care supporters to celebrate and honour the lives of loved ones and brings awareness and raises funds for local Hospice Palliative care services. Last year, 217 residents and their families called Chapman House their home. The residential hospice palliative care at Chapman House is provided at no cost to residents and their families.

Currently, Residential Hospice of Grey Bruce receives funding for 50% of their operating costs annually. We want to help raise funds to support the other 50%, so that we can ensure quality Hospice Palliative Care continues in Grey Bruce!

This year, Residential Hospice of Grey Bruce is holding a virtual event, and we are excited to participate! Please help them in their efforts to support Residential Hospice of Grey Bruce by donating today.

Finance Report April 2022

Mark Worthington, Chair

The Financial statement to the end of April (included in this Newsletter) indicates a deficit of \$17,757. This is largely because we have paid our Insurance bill of \$12,488.

We are 1/3 of the way through our year and Givings are down \$5078.

This is concerning considering we are back to in person services. The numbers are not in yet on the Harriston meats fund raiser but to the end of April fundraising was \$0.

It is important to point out that we are spending \$0 on music and are only paying for weekly Pulpit supply for the various ministry we are arranging weekly.

It is strongly recommended that people come out or to hear the recommendations, and findings of the Visioning committee on May 29.

They will be asking for "Approval in principle" for use of funds from our Memorial/Investment fund for changes to the building to make it more usable for Rentals etc. One of the suggestions is a chair lift at the steps to the office to make the basement more accessible. Matching "Grants" will be available for some of these upgrades.

Harriston Meat Fundraiser

Thank you to all who participated in this effort. Our grand total raised was \$2563, which included a generous donation. A total of 37 orders were received, fewer than the same endeavour last year. While we do not wish to over emphasize this type of "product" fundraiser, it is clear that by simply doubling the number of orders, we could effectively double our revenue.

Sometimes a worthwhile mission will last a lifetime but, in this instance, it only took 58 years to complete the task.

It all began back in 1964 when I was working in The City of London and living just north of the Angel, Islington. In those days an antique market operated down at the Angel each Saturday morning and I was a frequent prospective purchaser. Not that I bought very much – I didn't have the funds – but I was always on the look-out for an unrecognized treasure.

And that was how I came to acquire an ancient Family Bible that had once belonged to a family in Cornwall. The first entry records the marriage of John and Mary Ann Hore at St. Austell on May 18, 1850.

I could not imagine how any family would abandon such a priceless heirloom and I was determined to find out more about the family and, if possible, return the orphan to its rightful home.

The search took much longer than expected but I won't bore you with the journey and will skip forward to 2020 and the start of the pandemic. In order to use times of lock-down to good effect by reducing my collection of 'stuff' (such a harsh word), I made a final attempt to locate a member of the Hore family who would recognize the importance of the Bible. At last technology had caught-up with my endeavour and I was able to connect with the right person who now lives in a small village in Sussex.



Evolving Worship

October 17, 2021 was a benchmark day here at Annesley. During that service, under the guidance of our Pastoral Charge Supervisor, Kathy Underwood, a number of needs were recognized. To meet those needs, several initiatives were taken, including the formation of two new (ad hoc) committees, namely the Lay Worship Team and the Visioning Committee.



In Chairman Dale Beare's report elsewhere in this Newsletter, he outlines the mandates which guide each of these vital committees.

We wish to compliment and thank the members of both committees for their demanding and thorough work.

We will be hearing more from the Visioning Committee at the Congregational meeting on Sunday 29, and I would reiterate that their work is critical to where we will find ourselves as a church community in the future.

So I am just going to say a few words in praise of the Lay Worship Team. For fear of leaving anyone out, I will not name names, but there is a considerable network, over and above the original core group. It is through all of their efforts, carried out in the absence of a permanent minister and without a music director, that we are delivered a credible and meaningful worship service each Sunday, week in and week out.

And their efforts are brought to the in-person congregation as well as the viewers on YouTube by a small group of technicians responsible for both online audio and video as well as audiblity and screen effects in the sanctuary. And at a material cost well below what was projected and budgeted. It is clear that this "product" continues to improve with each passing week. I commend those involved for working together in spite of some widely differing views and opinions on how best to achieve those ends. Their willingness to collaborate is to be commended. We thank them, one and all.

The YouTube worship service is made available to us all not without a cost. There are ongoing weekly production expenses. Whether you have been attending worship in person or virtually on YouTube, we thank you for your financial support. We all need to maintain our weekly givings and the best and easiest way is to be on PAR (pre authorized givings). Thank you again

Technology Team Report April 2022

At our Annual congregational meeting last July 14 we were given approval to spend \$\$\$ on a Live Streaming system and Cameras to permit taping, and streaming of Weekly Services and other events including weddings and funerals.

The numbers I suggested were between, \$15-\$25,000 and that was for streaming equipment and cameras only. We got busy buying and installing the equipment in August and were ready to Stream by the time we were back to in person services in October. As time went on we discovered that our sound system was not up to the task.

So in addition to our original needs we have purchased microphones, microphone booster for soft spoken people, New Headphones for Hearing impaired people, new wiring to take the sound from the microphones to the Master Control Center upstairs and a variety of other needs so that the sound is good for the people at home and the sound is also good for the folks seated throughout the sanctuary.

The installation of all of this equipment has been slow due to the time needed from a mostly volunteer workforce. There is quite a mess of wiring and equipment that we are slowly working at tidying up.

There is a dire need for more volunteers to run the equipment and help with the ongoing installation and rigging. If volunteers cannot be found we will incur the expense of hiring paid contracted help for this important part of our building usage.

To date we have spent \$7,764 on the equipment and expect to keep the final tally under \$10,000. Tim Reilly has been integral in all of this work and currently works the controls every Sunday from about 8 til noon. He also comes into church every Friday to set up a sound system for the Centering Prayer group. All of the events such as weddings funerals chamber of commerce meeting and other rentals such as music recitals etc require Tim's presence. This is not sustainable and why we need a larger group of individuals involved in our Technology needs. We must also thank Stacey Hiltz and Patti Shaw for their hard work and involvement to bring us the experience they provide by creating and operating the information seen on the Television screens during worship every Sunday. Stacey and Patti have also been involved in launching and updating a new and improved website for the church. This is an ongoing task that requires continual work and is an area more help is needed.

Please feel free to ask any of this group questions and do not be afraid of technology it is much easier than you might think to help out.
